... the Promised **Messiah**;

God gave his law *through angels* to Moses, **who was the mediator between God and the people**. ²⁰ Now a mediator is helpful if more than one party must reach an agreement. But God, who is one, did not use a mediator when he gave **his promise** to Abraham.

God announced the coming of the promised messiah through the prophets and the angels. Is that what He did when giving the Law?

While we consider here "the Law" – let's also consider this:

Romans 4:15 – "Where no law is, there is no transgression."

Paul concludes verse 19 by pointing out that Moses – who was given the Law –
was a mediator between God and the people. Therefore, the law was a
, and Moses was the mediator between the two parties.

Regarding a mediator, what is the difference between a contract / covenant, and promise?

Continuing with v. 21-22 -

²¹ Is there a conflict, then, between God's law and God's promises?

Absolutely not! If the law could give us new life, we could be made right with God by obeying it. ²² But the Scriptures declare that we are all prisoners of sin, so we receive God's promise of freedom only by believing in Jesus Christ.
